"WAIMATE 50" - 1959

14.2.1. 19.2.1

When Bruce McLaren took the chequered flag in the first "Waimate 50" ever held last year, he confirmed in the minds of the large crowd of spectators present that here was a race that they could not afford to miss next season. It was indeed a race of changing fortunes that day. As the flag fell to start the race, so did the rain. It really poured as so many of you will remember, and in a matter of minutes the track was inundated with water and in places the cars resembled speedboats as they ploughed a wake through the flooded roads. During this rain the bigger cars led by John Mansell and Ross Jensen in their Maseratis made a break on the little Coopers who were plugging along half blinded and almost half a lap behind. Mansell, driving the rather ancient 250F Maserati which Moss drove to victory in the 1956 New Zealand Grand Prix, took the initiative in the first few laps and headed the field with Syd Jensen and McLaren well down the list.

Then the rain stopped. And what a change came over the race. Where previously the drivers had been hurtling into deep pools of water on the track, they now had to contend with clouds of steam that rose from the rapidly drying road. It was then that Syd Jensen and McLaren began to overtake the Maseratis, and no one can forget the struggle between McLaren and Ross Jensen in the big El Salvador Maserati, as the little Cooper tried to nose in front to take the lead. As the track dried, however, the larger car's advantage of more adhesion dwindled away and the little Cooper driven by the popular young New Zealander who was about to leave for Europe and his first season with the Cooper Works, shot into the lead and came home a fine winner in one of the most spectacular races ever likely to be held in New Zealand.

COOPER DOMINANCE IN NEW ZEALAND

This season, up until the date of printing, Coopers have scooped the major placings at all the meetings. At Ardmore 50,000 car racing fans saw Jack Brabham and Bruce McLaren, the two Cooper Works drivers, playing ducks and drakes with the rest of the field, and coming in to win easily with Brabham taking the laurels. Behind these two came the top Australian, Bib Stilwell in a 2.2 litre Cooper to take third place, and behind him in fourth place came yet another Cooper driven by Australian Stan Jones.



At Levin the procedure was followed again, with Dennis Hulme leading home Syd Jensen and George Lawton, all being Cooper mounted. The Lady Wigram Trophy race was really handed to the World Champion Jack Brabham before he even started, barring mechanical breakdowns. McLaren had blown his 2½ litre Cooper up well and truly in practice the previous day and he was driving the Lycoming Special, sportingly lent to him by Aucklander Malcolm Gill. The two Englishmen, Piper and Burgess, livened up proceedings in the opening laps when it appeared that they were really. harrying Brabham, but the Australian had plenty in hand and had no trouble coming home ahead of Piper, who drove a good race in the rather outclassed Formula One Lotus, and the manager of the Cooper Works racing stable, Ian Burgess driving a 2.2 litre Cooper.

As I write this there are still three South Island meetings left and they appear to be certain victories for the overseas entries, barring a most unexpected performance by a local driver.

As can be clearly seen, the little cars from Surbiton have developed a real stranglehold on New Zealand racing and threaten to dull the sport of motor racing in the eyes of thrill hunting race-goers. This, however, is viewing the matter from one side of the fence only. At the moment, in New Zealand, we are having the opportunity of seeing the top racing cars in the world propelled by world class drivers. This is a privilege very seldom accorded to any country lacking a Grand Prix listed in the World Championship. Coopers are dominating New Zealand racing, but they are also dominating world motor racing. Ferrari and Maserati have had their fling on top of the World Championship ladder and they have bowed before the might of the little green rear engined Coopers.

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New Zealanders complain of being bored with the little cars running around the tracks as if on rails, but they are forgetting that in Europe race fans travel thousands of miles and pay big money to witness the same spectacles.

The colour of British racing green has been hauled out of the also-ran lists in Championship races at last, after years of German and Italian supremacy. Surely New Zealanders should not be tiring of seeing British cars in their hour of glory, especially as they are driven by the ANZAC team of Jack Brabham from Australia and our own New Zealand driver Bruce McLaren.

OLDEST IN THE WORLD?

In the saloon race two of the oldest racing drivers in the world will be competing. Seventy-one year old Australian Lou Kingsley, who bills himself as the oldest racing driver in the world, will be racing against Andy Irving from Timaru, who pips the Australian by four years. Andy is 75 and will be racing the supercharged Volkswagen which he drove to victory in the saloon race at Waimate last year.

Lou Kingsley began his racing career five years ago with a Mark Seven Jaguar. From the Jaguar he graduated to a 220A Mercedes which he fitted with triple S.U. carburettors and made it one of the fastest saloons in Australia at the time. The Holden is fitted with a Repco head and also a pair of Weber carbs which give the car a fantastic lift.

Andy Irving began his racing career in the 1920's, winning the Marawai Beach Racing Championship in a $1\frac{1}{2}$ litre Brescia Bugatti in 1925. He had a successful run with the Bugatti which he sold in 1935, and from then until last year he has confined his activities to trials, competing in all the major trials in the South Island.

YOUNGEST?

At the other end of the scale, two of the youngest New Zealand drivers will be competing in the sports car race. The 18 year old favourite for the race, Jimmy Palmer from Hamilton, is driving the 1960 cc. Lotus, one of the fastest sports cars in the country. Jimmy started his motor racing two years ago when he drove a Buckler in all the North Island races. Last year we had the opportunity of seeing Jimmy competing at the "Waimate 50" in the little 1100 cc. Lotus that showed its heels to many of the faster cars that day. Jimmy now races one of the latest sports cars from the Lotus factory and is handling it very well.

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

It seems that Timaru can boast a young driver as well as an old one, and the young one in this case is 20 year old David Young who will be driving his C Type Jaguar. David previously raced an XK120 Jaguar, but last season he raced a later model car designed solely for racing. The bright blue C Type Jaguar is the forerunner of the D Type Jaguar which will be driven at Waimate by Angus Hyslop. Although lacking disc brakes and some suspension modifications, as well as a few horses in the power department, David has turned in some very fast lap times. His main trouble this season has been keeping the oil pressure needle off the zero mark. Overheating has caused the oil to lose its viscosity, providing negligible lubrication to the fast moving parts in the engine. However, both David and Jimmy have showed definite promise this season and a sponsored trip to Europe would appear to be just around the corner for both of these popular young drivers.

THE NEW ZEALAND SCENE

The New Zealand Racing Drivers' Championship seems to be more in doubt this year than it has been for a long time. John Mansell seemed to be the logical winner with the ageing 250F Maserati, when it was learned that Ross Jensen, who won the title in 1958, would be a spectator this season apart from his Ardmore drive in Quirk's Maserati, and also that the Cooper Works driver Bruce McLaren would be leaving for Argentine early in February and would not be competing at Dunedin, Teretonga, or Waimate. At present Bruce leads with 20 points.

Mansell drove a faultless race at Ardmore and brought his car into fifth spot ahead of cars that seemed on paper to be far more superior machines. He missed the Levin meeting while he prepared his car for the South Island circuits and Dennis Hulme drove his 1960 cc. Cooper into first place in the main race. Mansell was set for more points to add to his score at Wigram, but he had the cruel misfortune to shear the bolts in his universal on the first lap and had to retire from the race. Christchurch driver Pat Hoare was second New Zealander home behind McLaren, a placing which put him in second place on Championship points, equal with the 18 year old Hamilton driver, Jimmy Palmer, with his 1960 cc. Lotus. As both Hulme and Lawton have been picked for the driver to Europe sponsored trip this season neither driver presents a great threat as they are not competing in the final races on the calendar. At present (after the Wigram race) the title is wide open to the fastest New Zealand driver with the most reliable car.
